Bee Card: Nelson's new electronic bus card is here!



Nelson has a new way of paying for the bus. From 3 August passengers will be able to pay for travel using the new Bee Card.

Replacing the NBus Card, Bee Card allows people to pay for their travel without using cash, manage the money on several cards at once and access Nelson and Tasman's cheapest bus fares.

Bee Cards are available for free from 6 July to 31 October and are available at BeeCard.co.nz and our retail outlets. Outside of the free period, Bee Cards cost \$5. As of Monday 20 July, 3271 Bee Cards had been issued.

To top up a Bee Card online, it needs to be registered at BeeCard.co.nz. There are no transaction fees.

Nelson City Council Infrastructure Chair Brian McGurk says the new Bee Card makes bus travel in the region

smarter and easier. "There's no need to fish out a couple of dollars from behind the couch if you have forgotten to take out cash for

the bus. It's also more convenient than the NBus card as there is now an option to top up money online, this means our cheapest bus fares are now accessible to more people."

Council staff will be visiting retirement homes to explain the new system and give out free cards. There will also be ambassadors riding the bus and drop-in sessions at the libraries.

Councillor McGurk says it's extremely important to

Council that everyone in Nelson is given the opportunity to use Bee Card.

"Cash fares are still available, but travel is cheaper with Bee Card. We know this new system may be a challenge for some groups, but we have a fantastic customer service team working across Nelson and Tasman who are ready to help people with all aspects of getting and using a Bee Card. This new technology can make life easier for everyone."

Unregistered and registered Bee Cards can be topped up with cash at our retail outlets and on the bus. Bus drivers will not be able to give out change.

Once a Bee Card has money uploaded, users simply tag on and off the bus by holding the card over the Bee Card terminal as they enter. Card users are reminded to tag off so the system understands how far you have travelled. Without this information card users will be charged a higher default fare.

Community grants applications open

Nelson's non-profit community groups can now apply for a helping hand from Nelson City Council's Community Investment Fund.

The fund has \$125,000 available to support non-profit community organisations to deliver programmes and activities with a social development focus and that contribute to Council's community outcomes.

The fund's key priority areas are wellbeing and social development; children, youth and families; older adults; social cohesion; Learning and development and diverse communities.

This year, projects that reduce the impact of the COVID-19 emergency on vulnerable communities, and applications that support community safety, have been added as additional priority areas for grants.

Councillor and Community Services Committee Chair Matt Lawrey said one of the things that makes Nelson a strong, resilient community is the wonderful work of the city's not-for-profit organisations.

"The Community Investment Fund is one of the ways Council helps our not-for-profits to make a difference. Over the years the fund has helped groups supporting a really wide range of Nelsonians, including disadvantaged children, people living with disabilities and those suffering from drug addiction. "Many of those organisations will be wellknown to people but it's worth pointing out that we're always keen to also hear from those quiet achievers doing great work under the radar." Applications will be assessed by the

Community Investment Fund panel, who were elected by a community process last year, and decisions will be notified in September. For further information, or to apply for the

So as we celebrate Matariki, I encourage you to reflect on and continue to embrace values of manaakitanga (hospitality, kindness, generosity, support), and whanaungatanga (relationships, kinship, connections). Let these values continue beyond this month and into the rest of the year.



Exercising your dog on Council reserves

Dog registration forms were sent out by email and post at the beginning of June. This year, in recognition of the significant additional financial pressure caused by COVID-19, we have extended the date when late penalties for dog registration fees apply from 1 August to 1 September.

Recent amendments to the Dog Control Policy and Bylaw have resulted in changes to the areas around Nelson where dogs can be exercised on and off-leash.

The Bylaw aims to strike a balance between the wishes of dog owners, the welfare needs of dogs, wider public concerns, protection of local ecology, such as nesting shorebirds, and the grazing of sheep, which currently play an important role in weed management and fire prevention. As such, it considers where dogs should be allowed to be offleash, on-leash or not allowed at all.

Grazed areas

Under the new rules, dogs must be kept on-leash on land grazed with sheep in Council reserves, including small areas of the Grampians Reserve and Sir Stanley Whitehead Reserve. These on-leash areas will be sign-posted and you'll need to keep your dog on a leash even if you can't see any sheep. Sheep grazed in these reserves play an important role in weed management and fire prevention. There are still large areas within each reserve where dogs can exercise off-leash.

Dogs can still be off leash in the

grazed areas of Paremata Flats Reserve, Maitai River Esplanade Reserve, and Tantragee Reserve, but must remain under voice control. This is because these are cattle grazing areas rather than sheep grazing areas. Dogs are also allowed off-leash in the Titoki Reserve and Monaco Reserve, excluding the playground area.

Ecological areas

The Paremata Flats planted area is an ecologically-significant restoration project so continues to be completely off-limits to dogs. The Delaware Estuary and margins and Whakatū Drive Foreshore Reserve are onleash areas to increase protection of nesting shorebirds.

The Boulder Bank is an on-leash area from Boulder Bank Drive south to the Cut, but dogs are prohibited from 15 August to the last day in February each year from the Cut towards Boulder Bank Drive for 4 kilometres. This time period is a critical nesting season for the vulnerable banded dotterel. The Boulder Bank north from Boulder Bank Drive to Glenduan and Glenduan Reserve is off-leash, excluding the playground area.

Heritage Project Fund open for applications

Applications are now open for the 2020/2021 Heritage Project Fund grant round; applications need to be submitted by 5pm, Monday 10 August 2020, for grants of \$1000 + GST or more towards the cost of approved projects.

The fund is aimed at helping owners of heritage buildings, objects or sites (listed in the Nelson Resource Management Plan) with the cost of work that contributes to conserving Nelson's heritage properties.

We've already been in contact with owners of listed properties to let them know they can apply now. The grants are open to the owners of A, B, or C heritage buildings, objects or sites; iwi; non-profit heritage groups and heritage conservation/management groups.

The grants can be used to carry out work like

stabilisation, repair or restoration of original heritage fabric (i.e. masonry, joinery, earthquake strengthening or fire protection). It can also be used for professional services relating to heritage research, conservation plans etc.

Work carried out using grants funding must meet Nelson City Council and Heritage New Zealand approved standards.

Bee Card FAQ: Nelson's new electronic bus card explained

What is a Bee Card?

Bee Card is a prepay travel card that can be used on buses in the Nelson and Tasman region. It is also available in nine different regions of New Zealand. You can use your Bee Card for local public transport in Northland, Waikato, Bay of Plenty, Hawke's Bay, Taranaki, Manawatū-Whanganui, Nelson, Otago and Invercargill.

When do we get Bee Card?

Bee Card goes live in Nelson and Tasman on 3 August. Cards will be available for free on the Bee Card website and our retail outlets (see list below) from 6 July to 31 October.

How much does a Bee Card cost?

After the free period, cards will cost \$5.00. This is non-refundable.

You will need to top up your card so you can travel. The minimum top up is \$5 and the maximum is \$299. If you have a registered card, you can transfer money stored on the card to a new card if it is lost or stolen. We cannot do this with unregistered cards, though. There are no transaction fees for topping up your card.

Where can I get a card?

Nelson City Council, Nelson Public Libraries (Elma Turner and Stoke). Nelson SBL bus depot, Tasman District Council and Richmond Library. Cards are available online via the Bee Card website: BeeCard.co.nz, click 'Get a Card' in the top menu once you have created an account.

What bus services can I use Bee Card on?

Bee Card can be used on all NBus Services; R1-R7, the new loop route in Richmond and the Late Late Bus. This excludes SBL commercial and Ministry of Education services.

Why should I use a Bee Card?

You no longer need to worry about having cash for your journey. You can register your card online to manage your account, allowing you the ability to:

- Top-up the card online
- Set up an automated top-up, so you always have money on your card
- Apply and manage concessions, such as SuperGold
- View your transactions and journey history
- Link other people's cards to your account so you can top up family member's cards
- Cancel lost or stolen cards and transfer over any unused money
- For concessions you will no longer have to show your driver your ID as the concessions will be loaded onto your card.

How does the Bee Card work?

Bee Card is a tag-on tag-off ticketing system - when you board the bus, hold your card over the card reader to tag-on. Wait for the beep and green screen, then you're ready to go. When you've reached your destination, do the same again to tag-off. It's important to tag off to ensure you are charged the correct fare.

Information about your card and account is sent to the card readers via the central Bee Card system. It can take up to 12 hours for transactions and changes to show on your website account. If transactions or changes haven't appeared in your account, please check back after 12 hours.

If there's still a problem, you can contact Council on 03 546 0200 or in person at our Customer Service Centre.

How much will my trip cost?

Bee Cards allow bus users to pay less for their travel when compared to the cash fare. This table outlines the differences in fares for each zone.

How do I register my Bee Card?

Go to BeeCard.co.nz and set up an account – you will see the 'Create Account' button to click on the top right of the page. Fill in your details and choose a password. Once your account is created you will be taken to a page with an option to register your card. Click on that button and fill in the required details and you are ready to go. You can also set up your account at Nelson and Tasman Council's Customer Service Centres.

Can I still pay for my journey with cash?

Yes, drivers will still accept cash for your journey. You can also top up your Bee Card on the bus, but drivers can only accept exact money. This means that if you have a ten dollar note, drivers will only be able to put \$10 on the card and will not be able to give change.

Do I have to register my Bee Card?

You do not have to register your Bee Card, but please note that we cannot replace any remaining money on a lost or stolen Bee Card if it hasn't been registered.

How quickly will my balance be available on my Bee Card?

Online transactions generally go through the system within 12 hours. If you top up your card at a retail outlet point or on the bus, your money is loaded on to your card straight away.



Why doesn't my online transaction list show my top up?

With Bee Card, all data is stored on the card itself, but online transactions won't show on your card until it's next tagged on to a Bee Card device. In the meantime, your top up shows as pending in your online account.

Can I use my Bee Card to pay for more than one person?

We recommend that every passenger has their own Bee Card but you can pay for other passenger's fares with your card if needed. You'll need to speak to the driver, and any extra passengers will be charged the adult fare price.

Where can I top up in person?

You can top up at Nelson City Council, Nelson Public Libraries (Elma Turner and Stoke). Nelson SBL bus depot, Tasman District Council and Richmond Library.

I have a SuperGold Card, do I need a Bee Card?

Yes, you will need to have a Bee Card to access your SuperGold free off-peak travel concession. You'll also need to ensure that your SuperGold concession is loaded onto your Bee Card. After that, you won't need to show your SuperGold Card to the driver when you board - but you will need to carry it with you to show on request.

To load your SuperGold concession onto your Bee Card, you will need to register your card at BeeCard.co.nz and then click on 'Concessions' in the top menu. Alternatively, we can help you load your SuperGold card at Nelson or Tasman Council Customer Service Centres.

I'm a school student, how do I get my concession?

For children who are between 5 and 18 years old, the child concession will be automatically applied to your card when you register it. Children under 5 travel free.

I travel using another concession (e.g. tertiary student, community service), how do I access my discount?

You'll need to register your Bee Card and provide proof of your eligibility for the concession. To load the concession on your Bee Card, you'll need to take your card and proof of eligibility to Nelson City Council or Tasman District Council Customer Service Centre. Only SuperGold and child concessions can be loaded online through the Bee Card website as well as in person.

Parking Meters – make the most of the new system

Nelsonians have been using our new Pay-By-Plate meters since 29 June, and Council staff have been out and about helping people get used to the new system.

Many of you have similar questions about the new meters. Here's a few of the most common and our answers to them:

How do I avoid a queue at the meter?

We expect queues to die down once people get used to using the new meters and PayMyPark app. However, if you see a queue at a meter, remember you can pay for your park or claim your free hour at any meter in the City. If you are paying for two or three hours of parking, you will need to find a meter with a two or three hour time limit – you can find these on the periphery of all the major car parks. The fastest way to park is with the PayMyPark app once your details are stored, it takes seconds to pay, and you don't have to use a meter at all. Parking meter locations, time zones and more can be found on Council's website: nelson.govt.nz/services/transport/ parking/where-to-park-in-nelson

Do I have to upload money onto the app to get the free hour? No, you can claim your free hour without spending any money on the app. Choose your location and the time you would like to stay for (up to one hour), press the green button that says 'Buy for \$xx' and then enter your car registration number. Click next and the free hour will be applied without charge. Remember you only get one hour free, once per day, for each vehicle registration.

How do I split up the one hour free parking?

If you are using the meter, input your registration number, click OK, then press 'Adjust Time' to reduce the time parked down from one hour. You can do this in fifteen minute increments. If you are using the app, choose the amount of time you wish to park for and complete the transaction as usual. If you asked for 15 minutes of free parking, you will have 45 minutes left to use later in the day. If you choose to use your whole hour in one go, please note that you can move your car around the city and park in any paid parking spot for free until that hour runs out.

Public Notice: Adoption Of Dog Control Bylaw 2020



Notice is given that the Council at its meeting on Thursday, 25 June 2020 adopted the "Dog Control Bylaw 2020" No 221.

The Council resolved that the bylaw shall come into effect on Monday, 27 July 2020. Copies of the bylaw will be available online at nelson.govt.nz or free of charge at the Customer Service Centre, Civic House.

The Nelson City Council Environmental Grants Scheme can help you to help the environment

Applications for this contestable grants fund are open from Monday 3 August until Monday 31 August 2020. There will be a second funding round in February 2021 for the 2020–2021 financial year.

If you are a group or individual working to improve the health of Nelson's natural environment, you may be eligible for an Environmental Grant.

In 2019–2020, environmental grants totaling \$314,214 were awarded to 61 groups or individuals to support a range of environmental outcomes including protecting and restoring wetlands, streams, native forest and biodiversity corridors and managing highly erodible land. Funding was provided through Council's Nelson Nature, Healthy Streams and Sustainable Land Management programmes, with approximately half of the grant funding provided through MPI's Hill Country Erosion Fund.

Feedback from applicants on the new grants scheme has been overwhelmingly positive.

Councillor's Comment

Councillor Brian McGurk

Heraclitus, a Greek philosopher, has been quoted as saying "change is the only constant in life". I think many of us have a love-hate relationship with change, especially when it comes with new technology. I know I do.

But, if we are brave enough to take the plunge, change can bring benefits. Last year we completed the rollout of LED streetlights. The upgrade took advantage of funding from NZTA. LED lights provide better quality lighting that makes our streets and footpaths safer. They will pay for themselves within a few years through much lower energy costs, as well as reducing the effects of light pollution on our night sky.

We have just finished rolling out the new Pay-by-Plate parking meters.

The old meters used 1700 rolls of paper a year, that came from Singapore. Going paperless we are saving about \$102,000 annually and we are avoiding littering our environment. The old, mechanical parking meters had reached the end of their useful life and were costing about \$80,000 annually in maintenance just to keep working. By making parking smarter, people spend less time circling, looking for parking spots. Our traffic lights monitor traffic flow and are adjusted to meet shifting traffic flows and patterns.

Next month, we become the latest region in New Zealand to introduce Bee Card, a single electronic travel card for public transport that can be topped up online.

Many Nelsonians will be familiar with the Snapper Card in Wellington and Bee Card is much the same. Bee Cards allow bus users to pay less for their travel compared to the cash fare.

With the adoption of smart new transport technologies, Council is providing residents with access to faster and safer travel choices, reducing pollution and emissions and saving residents and ratepayers thousands of dollars each year.

During Level 4 of the COVID-19 shutdown, Council provided a three-month automatic rent and outgoings suspension to its tourism and hospitality tenants and community organisations until 30 June 2020, with other Council tenants assessed on a case by case basis

Council is now offering some further relief:

- · An additional two months rental relief through to 31 August 2020 for community
- groups who rent Council-owned premises.
- An additional five months fee waiver to all

active carpark and footpath dining licenses, concessions and street stalls through to 30 November 2020. This is designed to assist small businesses and encourage footfall in the central city and popular destinations such as Tahunanui.

Mayor Rachel Reese says the initial assistance was part of Council's comprehensive relief package to support Nelson businesses through the shutdown, but acknowledges that even though shutdown has ended, for many businesses and community organisations the recovery has only just begun.

"We're committed to a thriving Nelson economy, and this is one way we can continue to show our support. We hope this will make life a little easier for local businesses.

"Likewise we are committed as a Council

to help those that help others and that's why we are continuing our rent relief to the organisations that do so much to assist our community."

Simon Duffy of Uniquely Nelson says the next few months will be critical for the city's retail and hospitality sector.

"We've come this far but we all need to continue to support our local businesses. especially in the hard-hit hospitality sectors.

"It's good to see Council offering longerterm support - this will help them get through the critical time between now and summer so that we are ready and waiting to welcome the influx of visitors in what is traditionally our busiest season."

Betsy Eyre honoured with new information panels

In 1956, Nelson City Council welcomed its first woman Councillor, Betsy Eyre.

It was the start of 17 years on the Council for Betsy, where she served nine years as deputy mayor and topped the polls at four Council elections.

On August 1, Betsy's trailblazing legacy and community spirit will be remembered with the unveiling of an information panel in her honour, erected at the park named for her, Betsy Eyre Park in Brook Valley.

Nelson Mayor Rachel Reese said Betsy's appointment to Council helped pave the way for those who came after her, but the journey had been a long one.

"It's a testament to Betsy's true community spirit that she continued to serve the Nelson community as a Councillor for so many years, and that she was honoured by the community with the naming of Betsy Eyre Park.

"It wasn't until last year, some 63 years after Betsy was first elected, that a full gender balance around the Council table was reached. That's a long time. But who knows how long it could have been without Betsy taking that first step."

The site of Betsy Eyre Park was originally earmarked for housing, but in 1976 a community movement to have the site cleaned up and made into a public park was launched.

Betsy became involved and helped both the community and Council present submissions to the Department of Lands and Survey to have the land gazetted as Recreation Reserve.

A petition to name the new park after Betsy was started by residents and was signed by then-Mayor Roy McClennan and every Councillor at the time. Betsy opened the park on 17 September, 1977.

Councillor Mel Courtney served on Council with Betsy and described her as having a deep love of people and her community.

"I worked closely with Cr Betsy Eyre in my dual role as a Nelson City Councillor and Member of Parliament for Nelson. Together we allocated pensioner housing and selected tenants for Government housing.

"I remember Betsy as a strong and intelligent woman who had to overcome the barriers and bias of being the sole female on Council at that time. She possessed a bright and happy disposition and was fun to work with - we laughed a lot together."

We've got this! Nelson Tasman economic response campaign kicks off

COVID-19 has hit Nelson Tasman's economy hard. But confidence is also contagious and this time locals are being asked to help spread it as part of a new regional marketing campaign called 'We've got this / Kei a Tātou'.

Project Kōkiri , which was initiated and led by Nelson City Council, Tasman District Council, Nelson Regional Development Agency, Nelson Tasman Chamber of Commerce, iwi and the Government's regionally based agencies, was created during lockdown and tasked with establishing an economic strategy that would speed up the region's recovery.

Part of that was the development of a response campaign to support local businesses and, at the same time, promote the region.

Project Lead and CEO of Nelson Tasman Chamber of Commerce Ali Boswijk says the term 'we've got this' will be used to create a sense of confidence among locals that the region is in good hands and the economic recovery is well under way. But it will also be used literally to show what the region has to offer.

A launch video features well known locals like Pic Picot, Mayor Rachel Reese and comedian Guy Williams, but the success of the campaign relies on everyone playing their part and sharing the best of what the region has to offer. Locals are being asked to film or photograph their favourite places, businesses and products from the region and share them on social media with the hashtag #nelsontasman or the tag @ NelsonTasmanNZ. A range of brand assets, from ready-to-print posters to animated GIFs for use on various social media channels, have been created and are available to download via the website wevegotthis.nz.

The best efforts will be displayed on the campaign website and also shared via Nelson Tasman's social media channels and on digital screens around the region as daily and weekly highlights.

Continuing the collaborative spirit, a wide range of local businesses have contributed more than \$25,000 worth of prizes to further incentivise locals to get involved. All those who submit an entry will go into the draw to win daily prizes.

Waimea Road/Princes Drive intersection roadworks – an update

The intersection joining Waimea Road and Princes Drive will reach a new phase next month when the developer's contractors complete work on the western side of Waimea Road.

Once completed, the road layout will change so work can start to widen the road on the eastern side and construct a central traffic island.

During this new part of the project, we expect traffic to continue to be delayed at peak times. The detour in place for cyclists and pedestrians on the Railway Reserve will remain.

The contractor is working as efficiently as possible
